Appointment of Consultants

Transport Scotland issued a Contract Notice for expressions of interest in the tender for the A96 Dualling East of Huntly to Aberdeen Multi Disciplinary Support Services Contract' (Consultants) on 27th January, with the aim of reducing those tendering to a maximum of five consultants. The shortlist was announced on 4th April 2017. AECOM Ltd, Amey Arup Joint Venture, Atkins WSPJoint Venture and Jacobs Ltd have been invited to bid.

The four consultancies/ joint ventures will now tender for the work with an expected award early summer 2017. Award of the £50 million, 20 year contract to the successful Consultant will commence the 2 year Stage 2 programme which will see the current broad lines on the map taken to detailed route options. There will be a 'Meet the Team' presentation approximately 6-8 weeks after the award, but this will not take place during the summer school holidays. It looks as if they are going to be tight for time to have a 'Meet the Team' before the holidays, therefore we are probably looking at September. Choice of the final route options will be taken by Holyrood during 2019.

What action can Save Bennachie take? We as a group of currently 760 members who have responded by e-mail and 2,400 members linked on Facebook must know the Team and ideally 'Meet the Team' at the earliest opportunity. Every one of our members will have their own angle on Saving Bennachie and it is vital that all members get involved. The Core Group will keep you posted on the award of the contract to Consultants and circulate details of any meeting with Transport Scotland and the Consultants.

The Battle of Mons Graupius

Could the slopes of Bennachie have been the site for the Battle of Mons Graupius between the Romans and local native Caledonian tribes?

Mons Graupius was the biggest and bloodiest battle fought in Northern Scotland. It was fought in the North East of Scotland. There are three or four possible sites - much evidence points to Bennachie being the location.

An exceptionally large Roman camp was found at Durno in 1975 by Dr J K St Joseph during an aerial reconnaissance flight. It covered about 144 acres and is between Pitcaple and Old Rayne. The ditches were eleven feet wide and four feet deep. It was designed to hold 24,000 men and it is the biggest Roman marching camp found beyond the Antonine Wall. It is likely this was a base for a large battle. The two sides could have met for battle not far from the camp between the Gadie Burn and The Mither Tap on the lower slopes of Bennachie as suggested by Dr Joseph in his reconstruction.

In AD 84 the Roman army led by Agricola "reached Mons Graupius which he found occupied by the enemy" (as told by in the account of the Battle of Mons Graupius by Tacitus). The Caledonians massed to protect a prominent hill position. Tacitus estimates 30,000 men although this could be highly Could this have been Bennachie with its Pictish fort? exaggerated. The 2 forces joined battle with the rough ground at the base of the hill making cavalry attacks by the Romans difficult. Initially the battle was being won by the Romans with their superior weaponry but the Caledonian tribes held the hillside. As the Caledonians came forward, however, the Roman cavalry on small agile horses attacked from the sides and scattered the local tribes, causing mayhem and carnage. The Romans lost around 360 men, the Caledonians many more as the remainder scattered.

The Bennachie site as described by Tacitus comes close to the Bennachie we see - with the steep and concave northern slopes and the mention of the top of several hills - could it be the Bennachie massif? Could this be the site of the Roman victory at Mons Graupius?
